## Family prepared for months for an axolotl

Breckin Alexander, an 11-year-old Winterset student, has been the proud owner of an axolotl named Luna since this past April — for about eight months. Axolotls, which are a kind of aquatic salamander, are usually found in one of three colors: white albino, yellow albino and brown. They typically grow to about a foot long and originally came from a lake in Mexico City called Lake Xochimilco. Axolotls have an average life span of about 15-20 years.

"I was watching 'Gravity Falls,' and it had a backwards message that, when turned around, spelled 'axolotl,' " explains Breckin. "A year later, I wondered what it was and looked it up. I thought they were really cute. They have three 'horns' on the sides of their heads that are actually their gills."

Breckin's mother, Kendra, says she started searching for axolotls because of Breckin's interest in them.

"I did some searching on Facebook and found a breeder in West Des Moines," she says. "He has been super helpful in answering all of our questions. We made Breckin prepare for six months before we got his axolotl because they can be very finicky about water temperature, the size of their tank... basically anything. They aren't supposed to have rough things around them because they can get scratched easily."

"I had to look up lots of stuff about axolotls such as if they are legal in the State of Iowa," says Breckin. "I found out that they are legal

# City prohibits "dangerous animals"

The City Code for Winterset prohibits owning certain animals deemed "dangerous." The list of animals not allowed includes: wolves and coyotes; badgers, wolverines, weasels, mink and other mustelids (except ferrets); bears; all apes including chimpanzees, baboons and macaques; monkeys, except the squirrel monkey; elephants; wild boar; black widow spiders and scorpions; snakes which are naturally venomous and poisonous; all cats, except domestic cats, including, but not limited to, lions, cougars, tigers, jaguars, leopards, lynx, bobcats; raccoons, opossums, and skunks; alligators and crocodiles.

in Iowa, but that they aren't legal in places like New York and Indiana, and, in New Mexico, they are illegal to import."

Breckin says he can't really touch Luna, but sometimes he'll take a capped Sharpie and "draw" on the side of her tank to play with her.

"We're always looking for signs of sickness," shares Kendra. "You can tell a lot by watching their 'horns' to determine how they're doing, such as, if the 'horns' are curling forward or getting pale."

Breckin adds, "I feed Luna blood worms that get their name from their red color. She eats one time per day. I have to dangle the worms in front of her face, but I have to be careful that she doesn't get my fingers. It doesn't hurt if she does, though, because her teeth are too weak."

Luna lives in a tank in Breckin's room. Axolotls prefer darker, cooler spaces, so the lights are almost always off in his room.

"We shut the heater vent in Breckin's room so that it isn't causing too much heat," comments Kendra. "The tank is by a window, but Breckin makes sure to keep it closed."

One of Breckin's favorite facts about axolotls is that they can regrow basically any part of their body. He also likes that, when they yawn, their mouths look wide.

"They always look like they're smiling," says Kendra. "It makes them look really cute."

Besides Luna, Breckin collects all things axolotl, including stuffed animals and a shirt that reads "I axolotl questions."

#### Sugar glider lessons

Megan Conner has been interested in sugar gliders since she was a teenager. She would visit the Iowa Pet Expo with her dad and visit the sugar glider exhibit at the expo each year.

"I always wanted one, but I knew they were expensive and were a big-time commitment," she says.

Sugar gliders are nocturnal marsupials the size of a hamster that are native to Australia and New Guinea, mostly in rainforest areas. In the wild, sugar gliders live an average of five to seven years, but in captivity they can live on average 12 to 15 years.

"Some people mistake sugar gliders for rodents, but they aren't," explains Megan. "They require an exotic veterinarian. There is no Iowa state or city ordinance concerning sugar gliders, and there is no permit required. They are legal in the state of Iowa to own," shares Megan. "I did discover that they aren't legal in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Hawaii."

One day a couple of years ago, Megan looked at the Iowa Rescue League's website and saw a male sugar glider available on a first-come, first-served basis.

"I took half a day from work to go pick him up," she says. "At first, I got a hamster cage for him, not realizing that it was too small. I now have cages that are 5-feet tall, so my sugar gliders have room to glide.

"I named my first sugar glider Kona,"

continues Megan. "I got another one that I named Rocky. I rescued him from a Cedar Rapids couple. Rocky lost his mate last year. I had been wanting to find Kona a companion because sugar gliders are colony creatures. I was told that, if I made the drive to get him, I could have him for free, so that's what I did. Rocky and Kona lived beside each other in cages."

Rocky recently fell ill and was euthanized.

Megan says that sugar gliders are fun, but not beginner pets.


"They don't require shots, but most new owners take them for annual vet checks. They eat a staple diet that includes fresh or frozen fruits, veggies, applesauce, orange juice concentrate, and some types of proteins and rolled oats," she comments. "They are omnivores. They love eucalyptus, too, and are sap suckers. They can pull bark off a tree and suck sap out."

Megan takes her sugar gliders almost anywhere in little pouches.

"I try to take them out when I go out," she says. "Sometimes I take them to Walmart with me. People who see them either think they're cute or ugly. I don't boast about the fact that I'm carrying them around. I generally keep them in a special hoodie with a zipper pouch sewn into it that I got on Etsy. It just looks like a normal sweatshirt."

A fun fact she shares is that sugar gliders bark at each other to communicate.

"It doesn't sound like a dog, but more of a high-pitched singular bark," she remarks. "They'll wait a couple seconds, then do another. They make lots of other sounds, but I think the bark is the funniest."

"Zach is 26 years old and autistic, but he is very verbal and knowledgeable," says Teresa. "He can give you lots of information on all his pets. He has loved to keep caged animals. He has done volunteer work with the zoo in the past. He loves exotic animals, and his pets have always been very therapeutic for him. He also has dogs and cats."

Zachary heard that bearded dragons were good natured, so he chose that as the next pet he wanted. Zachary's bearded dragon, Fernando, was gifted to him for Christmas.

Fernando eats crickets and mealworms. He will also occasionally eat some fresh veggies, and he lives in a 40-gallon tank.

"He has wood chips, water, and food dishes in his tank, but he doesn't require many toys," says Teresa. "Bearded dragons do require a lot of attention, though. Zach holds Fernando a lot. His tank has heat lamps on it because they need a warm climate."

Because of their love of warmth, they also enjoy being held by their owners.

"They cuddle up to you and are very friendly," she shares. "They are cuddly probably because of the body heat."

Bearded dragons are often found in the wild in Australia.

"They usually live about eight years," says Zachary, "and they usually grow to about 1.5 feet long. I'm not sure exactly how long they can get. When I got Fernando, he was about 6 inches long."

## **HOW TO** keep pipes from freezing and how to fix them

#### Q: What can homeowners do to prevent pipes from freezing?

A: Two things: leave your faucets dripping and open interior room and cabinet doors.

Turns out the old adage "leave your faucet dripping" when severe cold weather hits has some truth to it. When pipes freeze and break, it's usually not from the pressure of the ice. In most cases, it's the ice expanding inside the pipe and blocking the



remaining water. Then, water pressure may build to the point of the pipe splitting. If you give even a little bit of that water a place to go, you may be able to reduce your chances of your pipes freezing and bursting.

Second, leave the doors to interior rooms and cabinets open (vanities, sinks, etc.). This promotes warm airflow to areas of your home that would normally be much colder. Even rooms that don't have pipes can help warm air circulation.

#### Q: Do frozen pipes always burst?

A: Not always, but there is the potential of bursting.

If you're able to turn off the water supply quickly, you may be able to avoid a split pipe. However, be cautious about turning your water back on. There may be other frozen sections of your plumbing that you can't

If you decide to turn your water back on and there are other frozen areas, you may find yourself with far more damage than you started with.

#### Q: How can homeowners fix a frozen pipe?

A: The best advice we can safely give is to immediately turn off the water supply to your house and contact a professional.

Now, before you roll your eyes, let us explain.

Yes, you've probably heard about people thawing pipes themselves, but there's actually a big risk in that. You may have found one or two areas that froze, but there may be others. When you thaw just the spots you can see and turn your water back on, you may very well be rushing water to other frozen or even burst pipes you didn't know about. This can lead to water flowing into your house from several breaks in your plumbing system. Which is what we call a recipe for disaster.

#### Q: Does my homeowners insurance cover damage from frozen pipes?

A: It does. Your policy covers damage to the pipe(s) caused by freezing, and it may cover water damage that results from water escaping from the damaged pipe. Keep in mind that your policy may require your pipes be drained and/or heat maintained in your home for coverage to apply. (Note: There are specific policy provisions that affect this coverage for vacant homes and homes under construction.)

From minor to serious issues, here are a few reasons your check engine light might be on.

- 1. Loose gas cap. Check to make sure it's properly secured and that there are no cracks in it.
- 2. Failing oxygen sensor. If you're experiencing a decline in fuel economy and your check engine light appears, have your oxygen sensor checked.
- 3. Failing catalytic converter. When your catalytic converter is failing, it could be caused by issues related to other systems that work interdependently with it that have not been addressed.
- 4. Failing mass air flow sensor. Always have your mass air flow sensor checked when the check engine light comes on. Since many of the parts of the engine work together, when one part fails, others tend to follow suit.
- 5. Damaged spark plugs or wires. It's important to keep in mind that these are some of the most common reasons for the check engine light to come on; however, there can be other issues that cause the check engine light to illuminate. Also, a flashing check engine light indicates a major internal failure and requires immediate attention. Regardless, you should not ignore the check engine light. Always check it as soon as possible to ensure the integrity of your vehicle.

## **WEARING** a crown

A crown, sometimes called a cap, is a toothshaped restoration that fits over an existing tooth or an artificial tooth root, called an implant. It can be used in several situations:



- To cover a misshaped, damaged, or discolored tooth
- To provide a hard outer shield to a tooth that is weakened because of a large filling or dental treatment, like a root canal
- When attached to a dental implant or abutment to fill a space left by a missing tooth

Choosing the right material: A crown can be made to look like the tooth it is replacing. Often, a crown is made with a tooth-colored material that matches your teeth. Tooth-colored crowns can be made out of ceramic, porcelain or composite resin. In some cases, a metal crown will be placed. Metal crowns can be

made with gold or a silver-colored metal like stainless steel or nickel. You and your dentist can talk about the type of material that will be best for your crown. Some factors considered include:

- The location of the crown and how much of it will show when you smile
- The function of the crown, for example, whether it will be in the back where there is a lot of pressure during chewing
- The color and appearance of the surrounding teeth
  - The cost

You may also talk about insurance coverage with your dentist. Some of these materials are more expensive than others.

Placing a crown: Some crowns, like those made of stainless steel, come already made. They are tooth shaped and can be placed in one appointment. Others, like those made of composite resin, require two or more appointments to complete treatment. When the crown is being placed over a natural tooth, your

dentist will need to prepare the tooth that is serving as the base. Once the tooth is prepared for the crown, your dentist will make an impression. Some dental offices have computers that can make the crown in one appointment without an impression.

Conclusion: Crowns or caps are restorations that look like teeth and are made to fit over a specially prepared tooth or a dental implant. Crowns can be used to repair teeth that are misshapen, damaged, or weakened because of large fillings or root canal treatment. They also can be mounted on an artificial tooth root, called an implant. Crowns can be made of tooth-colored materials or metal. Factors like appearance, strength, and cost might influence which material you and your dentist select for your crown. In some cases, it will take more than one appointment to make and place your crown.



## **BUILDING** community spirit through home renovation

#### Eller targets neighborhood to flip homes.

Michael Eller worked in the corporate world as a systems engineer until this past year. He decided he didn't want to go back to working in that setting if his company decided to cease having him work from home. Instead, he opened a computer repair shop in Winterset and has begun to flip houses.

"There is another neighborhood in Winterset that has recently been revitalized, and I got inspired by the other houses," he explains.

He has restored a home he previously owned as a rental house.

"It's in a 'rougher' area of housing, and, at the end of the rental period was very torn up," he shares. "I decided that I didn't want to keep renting it out just to have to do major work on it every time a rental agreement ended, so I took it upon myself to fix it up so I could sell it."

The house is one of the original houses on that side of town. It was built in 1890 and has a limestone foundation. It has 150-yearold white oak cabinets in it.

"I remodeled everything in it," he says. "The house was trashed. When I was in my 20s, I worked with my dad doing fire and flood restoration, so I knew how to do it. I started with stripping the house. Then I added three coats of oil-based Kilz to everything. I had a new roof put on the house. Then I did texture, flooring and painting. Next came the cabinets and doors."

Eller put a custom deck on the house using 1900 barn wood that had been weathered gray.

"I sanded the wood down by hand to the raw wood," he says. "It turned out really nice."

He also put in a new HVAC system.

"I also did lots of work on the landscaping and curb appeal," he comments. "I added my own flair on the cabinets in the house. I created a breakfast nook where they are, and I changed them to have varying colors of wood. The colors make it pop. It's like old meets new and is very rustic."

"The whole process took longer than I thought. I was shooting for three months, but it took six months because I wanted to make sure I did everything the right way. - · Nonstick cooking spray
- 2 cups RAGÚ Simply Traditional
- 3 cloves garlic, divided
- 1/4 cup fresh basil, chopped, divided
- 1/8-1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes
- 1 log (10-10 1/2 ounces) goat cheese, softened at room temperature

- 1/4 teaspoon fresh thyme

- 1 large baguette, sliced on bias
- blistered tomatoes, for serving (optional)

#### )irections

- Position one rack in upper third of oven and one in lower third. Preheat oven to 375 F. Spray small, round baking dish with nonstick cooking spray; set aside.
- Add sauce to small bowl. Grate in two garlic cloves then add 1/8 cup basil and red pepper flakes. Stir to combine then pour sauce into baking dish.
- Smash goat cheese log into ball. Place ball between two sheets plastic wrap. Using hands, flatten cheese into thick, round disc about 1 inch smaller in diameter than baking dish. Remove goat cheese from plastic wrap and place in center of sauce. Drizzle cheese with 2 teaspoons olive oil. Sprinkle with fresh thyme, kosher salt and pepper. Bake on lower rack, uncovered, 20-25 minutes, or until sauce is bubbly and cheese is warmed through.
- Place baguette slices on baking sheet.
   Drizzle or brush with olive oil and



sprinkle with kosher salt. Bake crostini on upper rack 10-12 minutes, flipping halfway through. When bread is done, remove from oven, cut last garlic clove in half and rub cut side on bread.

- Top dip with remaining basil and blistered tomatoes, if desired, and serve with crostini.
- Note: To make blistered tomatoes:
  Heat skillet over medium-high heat
  until almost smoking. Add 1 pint
  cherry tomatoes to dry skillet and let
  sit 1 minute. Lower heat to low, toss
  tomatoes with 2 teaspoons olive oil and
  cook 2-3 minutes, or until tomatoes
  are about to burst. Remove from heat;
  sprinkle with pinch of salt and pepper.



## **COLLINS** collects vehicles of all kinds

From toy trucks and cars to the Jeeps his family drives

Kent Collins is surrounded by collector items of all kinds. At his farm homestead, which has been in his family for several generations, he has horse bits collected by his father. Some are display ready, and others are in buckets waiting to be restored. He also has lots of tack his father collected and many kinds of vehicles ranging from matchboxsized cars to the Jeeps he prefers to drive.



In either 1975 or 1976,

Kent's grandfather gave him a 164-scale semi-truck to play with.

"I used it as a toy," he shares. "It is Hot-Wheels sized, and it was either new or fairly new. I would use it to play with my friends. Over the years, I nearly destroyed it. It was missing its doors and some of the wheels. It wasn't until I went to DMACC that I learned it was a collectible. I knew my professor restored toys, so I took it to him so he could look at it. He got excited and said that it was a Winross. Those were made for promos for companies like the one my grandfather worked for out of Storm Lake. Professor Denny helped me clean it up, put doors and wheels back on it, and made it shelf ready. No one, not even my own daughter, has touched it since I put it on the shelf."

Kent has other collector's toy trucks besides the Winross.

"I collect toy trucks," he says. "When I see something cool that I think would look neat in my collection, I go ahead and buy it. I'm trying to get my hand on an Anderson Erickson Dairy truck. I haven't found one, but I'm not giving up yet. The one from my grandfather, however, is the most special and probably worth the most."

Jeeps are another collecting passion of Kent's.

"When I was 13-14 years old, I saw a CJ7 Jeep and knew that I just had to have one someday," he remembers. "It was just a basic, run-of-the-mill Jeep with nothing plush about it. It wasn't until I was in my 40s that I was able to own one. I saw an ad on Craigslist for a 1983 CJ7 Jeep, and a buddy of mine went with me to check it out. It was a good price, and I had the money, so I went to get it the day after I saw the ad. It was like it was meant to be."

Kent says, once you own a Jeep, it seems to multiply.

"I don't know how they do," he jokes.

The love of Jeeps has "infected" his whole family. He's had several Jeeps, including his wife's Jeep Liberty and a Jeep Cherokee until someone turned in front of him. At one point, he had their three Jeeps, his nephew's two Jeep Cherokees, and a friend's Jeep Comanche all at his place. His daughter also hopes to have a Jeep.

"I never thought I'd find the one I wanted, but I decided to wait to buy a Jeep until I did," he says. He's thankful for the meant-to-be moment of finding one.
